PLANTING PLAN



WILDFLOWERS, TERRACED GARDENS AND A FEEL FOR CENTRAL TEXAS ARE FOUND AT THE HILL HAUS.

Central Texas is known for its open grasslands and seasonal wildflowers, its rolling and sometimes steep hills, and its rocky, shallow soils. The limestone façade at the Hill Haus echoes the native bedrock found throughout the Edwards Plateau region. The landscape design invites the feel of the native central Texas landscape to the home and works with steep grades.

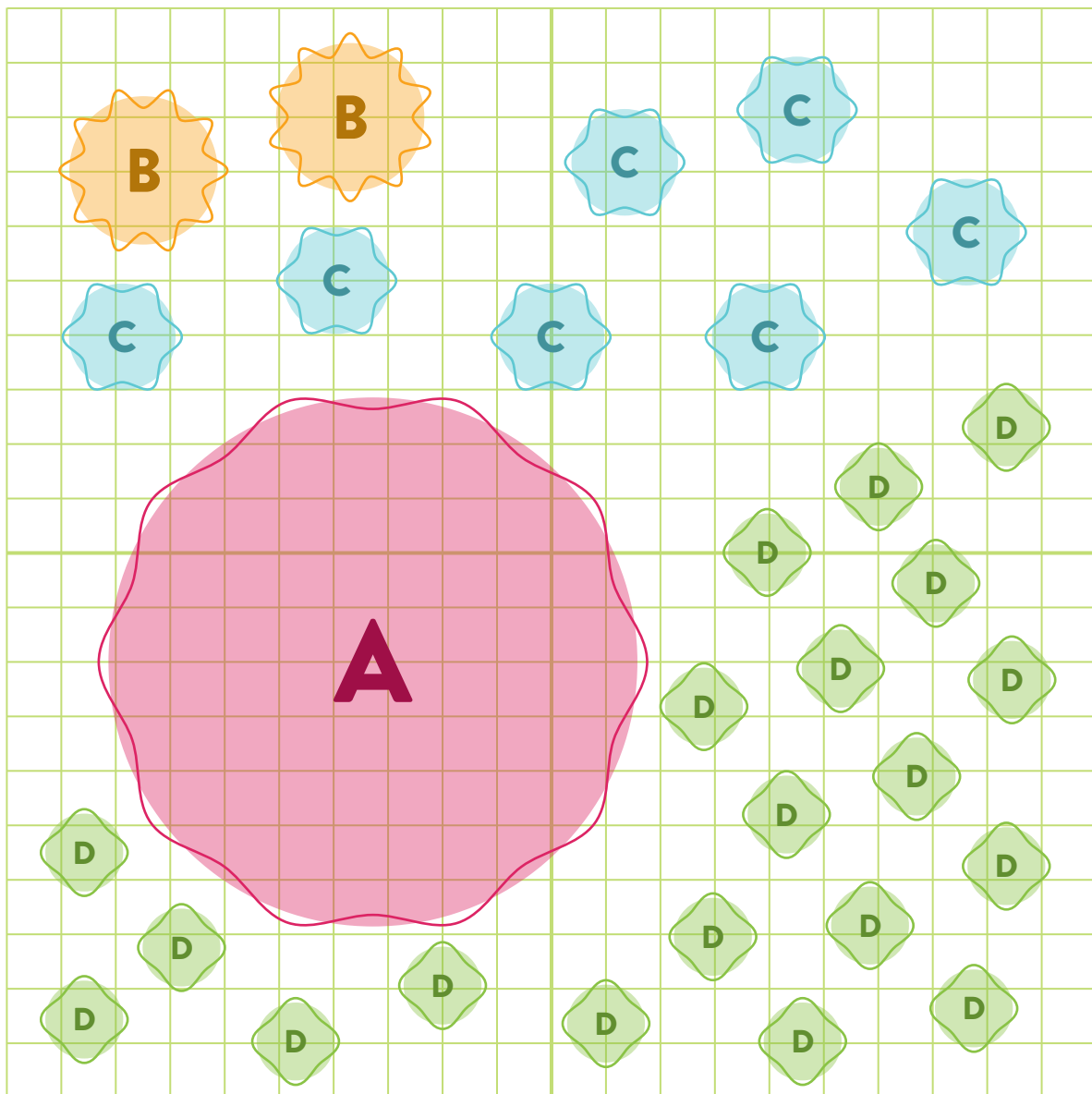
Mass plantings of both perennial and annual wildflowers, like black-eyed susans, chocolate daisies, and bluebonnets, dominate the landscape. They provide sweeps of seasonal color that replace a traditional lawn. Grass-like nolinas provide a fine-texture element among the wildflowers or spilling over the rock terraces. Informal plantings of Texas native shrubs, including agarita, coralberry, and flame acanthus, dot the landscape along with ornamental trees such as Texas mountain laurel and orchid tree.
